LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Patty Pilkerton delivered Eric Kidwell's legislative report. Suzanne Peterson from Samford University will be our representative to Legislative Day in Washington, D.C.

PROGRAM

Patty Pilkerton introduced the speaker, Dr. Michael Thomason. He is the director of the University Archives at the University of South Alabama (USA) and the managing editor of *Gulf South Historical Review*, published by USA. Dr. Thomason distributed a map of Mobile ca. 1725. He talked about Mobile's history as a port city and its diversity as a result of being "a town without walls." He said that Mobile has always been a conservative town, despite its diversity. In 1813 Mobile became part of the United States as a "prize" of the War of 1812. Mobile experienced exponential growth in the 1940s during World War II. Population is ethnically and racially diverse, with many African-Americans and people of Irish, German, and Jewish descent. Dr. Thomason also talked about Mardi Gras and its role in helping newcomers become part of the community. Following his talk, Dr. Thomason answered questions. Marcia Boosinger presented a book on Alabama architecture to Dr. Thomason. She then passed the gavel to Patty Pilkerton.

There being no further business, Patty Pilkerton adjourned the meeting.
