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From the AACRL President

When I arrived in Denver on January 22 for the Midwinter Conference of the American Library Association it was a beautiful sunny day and a balmy 68 degrees out. The next day it dropped about 35 degrees and when I left on January 26, the temperature was in the single digits and it was snowing fairly heavily. In early February, the weather in Alabama shifted pretty suddenly from nights in the teens to days in the seventies. Similarly, the American economy in 2008 experienced some rapid, dramatic changes (for the worse): it started out in fairly shaky condition and then in September and October most of us were taken by surprise at the sudden collapse of our major financial institutions. As I write these words, President Obama is negotiating with Congress to pass an enormous economic stimulus/recovery package to try to breathe some life into our financially devastated nation.

Not surprisingly, legislative advocacy is becoming ever more clearly a priority for librarians and library supporters. Traditionally, most library advocacy efforts such as the American Library Association's National Library Legislative Day have been largely the preserve of public librarians and library supporters. However, it is increasingly obvious that academic librarians and their allies need to get much more heavily involved in advocacy. In today's worrisome economic climate, the financial support that could almost be taken for granted for academic libraries is disappearing.

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Included in this issue of the newsletter is information on the forthcoming annual dinner/business meeting. AACRL President-Elect Rickey Best is working hard on the arrangements and we can look forward to hearing from Michael McLane, ACRL Program Officer for Legislative Advocacy, who will be our keynote speaker. The event will take place in Auburn. Please be sure to register soon (registration information and form are included in the newsletter).

Also included in this issue is a ballot for AACRL officer elections. Please exercise your right and responsibility as an AACRL member and vote!

To my surprise, I realize that this is the last President's Column I will be writing for the newsletter since the next issue normally comes out in August. While it's a bit premature for me to say farewell just yet, let me note that I appreciate having had the opportunity to serve as President for a second time. So far, it's been a relatively quiet year in terms of AACRL activities but sometimes a Calvin Coolidge is needed instead of a Franklin D. Roosevelt as President. President-Elect Rickey Best will have his own agenda for 2009-2010 but I can predict that legislative advocacy is likely to be featured during his term as AACRL President. Also, AACRL normally hosts a workshop every other year, so we very likely can look forward to a workshop sometime next year as well.

Meanwhile, though, I encourage you all to watch the federal and state legislative scene carefully and to take the time to contact your legislators when urgent issues relating to libraries appear on the horizon. We librarians and library supporters laboring in the academic vineyard are the best people for telling our legislators about the value of academic libraries, especially during this era of economic crisis.

Legislative News

Children's Books and Lead: Many of you have heard of the recent - and rather odd - issue coming from the Consumer Product Safety Commission regarding legislation that would include books under a new regulation on lead and lead testing in products meant for children. To summarize, because of recent incidences of lead being found in children's toys and other products (mostly, if not exclusively, in products manufactured outside the United States), the CPSC initiated an effort to require new testing for lead, and the way the new legislation was written, books would be included under the umbrella of products for children. The publishing industry, assisted by the library profession, has argued against including books in the list citing the fact that research (300 test results) conducted by the publishing industry proved that books did not contain lead in anywhere near sufficient quantities to be a concern. The main issue for libraries was the possibility that if the legislation as originally considered was executed, libraries could well find themselves in the position of having to empty shelves in children's departments or banning children from access to the very books written and published for them.

On behalf of AACRL, a letter of concern was sent to the CPSC, addressing many of the issues as identified by ALA. The letter additionally pointed out the potential impact on academic libraries, as many also have children's collections, and while these collections are primarily maintained to support education programs, many of us offer access to the children of our institution's employees.

The latest word is that the CPSC has reconsidered the issue of children's books in the new legislation and given a one year reprieve or stay of enforcement; however, monitoring of the situation will still be necessary.

H.R. 801: Rep. John Conyers (D-MI) of the House Judiciary Committee has reintroduced legislation that would reverse the National Institutes of Health Public Access Policy AND prohibit any other federal agency from instituting a similar policy. H.R. 108 is called the "Fair Copyright in Research Works Act." As a reminder, the

NIH's current policy requires researchers to deposit final peer-reviewed articles in PubMed Central and this must be done within twelve months of journal publication. Previously, this was a voluntary process.

ALA has asked that people contact their U.S. House representative, particularly if their representative serves on the Judiciary Committee, and urge them to oppose this bill. By the time this issue of the AACRL newsletter is published, the deadline for contacting will have passed, However, should this bill live after February 28, the library community will still have work to do, so keep up-to-date by connecting to ALA's web site (http://cap-wiz.com/ala/home/).

It is important to note that this issue is not simply a "library issue" but should be of concern to all who support public access, which should include college and university faculty, students and administrators. So stay aware of this issue and if need be, contact others on your campus and emphasize the importance of their involvement in opposing this legislation. ALA's web site is not only an excellent way of staying informed on legislative matters but it also has very useful resources and tools that can help you help others to communicate their concerns effectively to their representatives in the House and Senate.

Annual Business Meeting Information

At a recent meeting of the Executive Board, we discussed a number of items designed to a) increase membership participation; and b) whether or not a dues increase is necessary and advisable at this time. Following approval by the Board at its meeting on February 19th, I would like to submit the following for consideration by the membership, to be voted on at the April 8th meeting.

1. Current Organizational Structure: Committees: AACRL presently has only two standing committees – Nominating and Program.

Proposed Changes – Creation of the following committees as standing committees of the organization:

Membership Committee: Chaired by the Treasurer, to be responsible for working with the AACRL liaisons to aid in the recruitment of new members; to evaluate and recommend to the Board benefits for membership. Composition: In addition to the chair, two to four additional members will comprise the committee and will serve two-year staggered terms. Members may be reappointed.

Committee on Government Relations: Chaired by the Legislative Liaison, this committee will be responsible for monitoring legislation at both the state and federal level that may impact libraries generally, and academic libraries specifically. The Committee will also recommend to the Board recipients of a stipend to attend National Legislative Day in Washington, D.C.. In addition to the chair, two to four additional members will comprise the committee and will serve two-year staggered terms. Members may be reappointed.

By-Laws Committee: Chaired by the Past-President, to review annually the by-laws of the organization and to recommend to the Board changes in the By-laws. Any proposed changes, following approval by the Board, will be submitted to the membership at the next annual meeting. In addition to the Chair, the sitting President, the Vice President / President-elect, and two general members will comprise the committee. Terms of the membership will be annual.

Continuing Education and Training Committee: Chaired by the Vice-President / President-Elect, the committee will be

responsible for working to identify and sponsor workshops that provide training and other educational opportunities for academic librarians and library staff. In addition to the chair, two to four additional members will comprise the committee and will serve two-year staggered terms. Members may be reappointed.

Justification: As currently organized, AACRL does not appear to provide adequately for membership participation in the organization. By establishing the above committees, the organization will establish opportunities for involvement of the membership, which will result in a more active organization and provide training for future officers. Such committees as are being proposed are consistent with those offered at other Chapters of ACRL throughout the country.

2. Membership Dues increase.

Current status: membership dues are currently \$6.00 per year.

Proposal: That membership dues be increased to \$10 per year, with the following proviso:

Additional funds raised by this increase will be used to establish additional stipend(s) for AACRL members to attend National Legislative Day in Washington.

Justification: Academic libraries are badly under-represented in Washington during National Legislative Day. With the current economic environment, the academic library community needs to become more involved in meeting with the state legislative delegation. While AACRL provides a \$500 stipend from its operating budget for an individual to attend Legislative Day, the need for additional membership participation is critical.

Requirement: to receive the stipend, AACRL members must also be members of ACRL and a member of the legislative advocacy program.

Since AACRL membership dues have not increased since approximately 2000 / 2001, the Board feels that an increase at this time is justifiable. However, the Board also feels that we should ensure that membership will receive some tangible benefit from this increase.

Advocacy Main Theme at AACRL Chapters Council Meeting in Denver

On Sunday morning, January 25, ACRL Chapters Council President Kevin Merriman convened the Midwinter Chapters Council meeting. President Tim Dodge and President-Elect Rickey Best represented Alabama.

Michael McLane, ACRL Program Officer for Legislative Advocacy, spoke about the need to recruit people who could serve as legislative advocates on behalf of libraries, especially academic libraries. As of January, there were 45 legislative advocates in place but it is highly desirable to have several hundred more since the goal is to have a nationwide network in place that can quickly mobilize the voice of the academic library community so they can be heard by members of Congress when the need arises. The only absolute criterion for serving as an ACRL Legislative Advocate is that one must be a current member of ACRL. Mr. McLane will be the keynote speaker at the annual AACRL dinner/business meeting to be held in Auburn on April 8, so all interested members are encouraged to attend!

Mr. McLane briefly mentioned some of the legislative issues of concern such as access to government information and the future of the Federal Depository Library Program, copyright and "orphan" works, network neutrality, and the perennial, LSTA (Library Services and Technology Act).

ACRL President Erika Linke announced that legislative advocacy will be the main theme of her President's Program at the American Library Association annual conference in Chicago in July. The featured speaker will be Stephanie Vance of the ALA Washington Office. Linke mentioned that Change Magazine (a magazine covering topics in higher education) has requested three articles per year from ACRL about libraries.

ACRL Vice-President Lori Goetsch reported that at a Budget Committee meeting the topic of discussion was on coming up with ways ACRL can communicate the value of libraries to cost-cutting university administrators. Plans are in the works for *a*

Library Administration and Management Association) in 2010 on how to address the shortage of new library administrators

The three candidates for ACRL Director-at-Large briefly addressed the Chapters Council: Lisabeth Chabot (Ithaca College), Bill Nelson (Augusta State University), and Ann Riley (University of Missouri). Chapters Council Past-President Kathy Parsons noted that nominees are already being sought for the 2010 elections. This is a four-year commitment.
